ROCK!

2008 is the 600th anniversary of the construction of the Chapel of Our Lady of the Crag. It will be marked by a



fund-raising effort for much needed restorative work on the knight carving. The current estimate is approaching £10,000.

Using the acronym **ROCK** (Restore Our Chapel Knight), the plan is to organise a number of events on the 15th July 2008, with local groups and schools contributing. Knaresborough House will be the venue for displays, talks and refreshments. There will be an ecumenical service at the Shrine along with displays of artwork.

Historical note

The Chapel was carved out of the rock in about 1408 by 'John the Mason', and is believed to be the third oldest wayside shrine in

Britain. John was a local stonemason who worked in the nearby quarry. One day his son was playing on the rocky cliff when there was a great downfall of stones and boulders. The father of the boy attributed his son's narrow escape from death as a miraculous intervention by the Virgin Mary and is said to have built the shrine in thanksgiving and dedicated it to the Blessed Virgin.

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SPOTLIGHT on Shrine of Our Lady of the Crag Working Group

The group was set up in March 1997 when a St Mary's parishioner, who had looked after the chapel personally, left the area. We had a partnership with the

'Sacred Land Project', a national organisation based in Manchester promoting the building and maintaining of sacred places, and linking this work with environmental concerns. This partnership started with a visit from Radio 4, who recorded their morning worship from St Mary's, Knaresborough for Palm Sunday, 1997.

Since then, the group of never fewer than six members has met at least once every two months. The group is made up of local people, some of whom have lived in Knaresborough all their lives. The regular activities we organise are:

- **Worship at the chapel 4 times a year (mostly Catholic, but some ecumenical);**
- **Opening of the chapel from 2-4 p.m. on Summer Sundays;**
 - **Receiving visitors who wish to come for prayer and pilgrimage purposes;**
 - **Fund raising events, such as quiz nights at St Mary's;**
- **The writing of an information booklet, which is on sale in the town;**
- **The upkeep and enhancement of the garden.**

All money from booklet sales or donated by visitors goes towards the upkeep of the chapel.


During June-July 2000, in partnership with the 'Sacred Land' Project, we held a Millennium event which included:

- **A poetry competition for local school**

children, which was judged by nationally known poets. The best were published in a book entitled Songs of Sacred Places;

- **Art workshops both for the local Art Society, and for people with learning disabilities. An exhibition was opened by the then mayor at the Methodist Hall on Gracious Street;**
- **The unveiling of a new statue by well-known Yorkshire sculptor Ian Judd, which was consecrated by the Abbot of Ampleforth on 1st July. The**

previous statue is now on display in the church garden.

In March 2001 we added a handrail making climbing steps up to the chapel safer. We always repair the

results of vandalism to the windows as soon as we can. It takes time, as we have to go through specialist glazers, and check work with the Historic Churches' Commission first. This year we added a protective grill over the windows.

The Rule of St Benedict

Chapter 6 deals with silence, recommending moderation in the use of speech, but by no means prohibiting profitable or necessary conversation.

Rule. Chapter 6

Let us do what the Prophet says:

"I said, 'I will guard my ways,
that I may not sin with my tongue.
I have set a guard to my mouth.'

I was mute and was humbled,
and kept silence even from good things" (Ps. 38[39][39]:2-3).

Here the Prophet shows that if the spirit of silence ought to lead us at times to refrain even from good speech, so much the more ought the punishment for sin make us avoid evil words.

Therefore, since the spirit of silence is so important, permission to speak should rarely be granted even to perfect disciples, even though it be for good, holy edifying conversation; for it is written, "In much speaking you will not escape sin" (Prov. 1:19), and in another place, "Death and life are in the power of the tongue" (Prov. 18:21).

For speaking and teaching belong to the mistress; the disciple's part is to be silent and to listen.

And for that reason if anything has to be asked of the Superior, it should be asked with all the humility and submission inspired by reverence.

But as for coarse jests and idle words or words that move to laughter, these we condemn everywhere with a perpetual ban, and for such conversation we do not permit a disciple to open her mouth.

Update on Parish Youth

In the last parish newsletter, there was a spotlight on the Parish Youth and the ideas for a new Youth Club for those aged 11-14. We are delighted to report that Vivalafun Youth Club is now up and running and is doing fantastically well! It runs every other Sunday after the evening Mass and regularly attracts between 20 and 30 young people.

The small group of adults who helped to set up Vivalafun worked hard over the summer months to ensure that everything

was in place for a September start. This included arranging an introductory disco in July and organising equipment such as computers for the Youth Club itself.

The young people have enjoyed the sessions, including one in church about a wedding and marriage! They have also been included in the Christmas Vigil Mass. Quotes from the young people about the Youth Club include:

"It's really entertaining because there are lots of things to do."

"It's a good place to hang out with your friends and laugh and joke."

"People get to watch me play pool which is quite amusing!"

In the New Year, the Youth Club will be open on 13th and 27th January, 10th and 24th February, 9th March and 13th and 27th April. There are also plans to visit a Drama Workshop, a trip to Carlton Lodge for an activity day and a Stayawake event!

St Mary's Pastoral Parish Council
